Sharon Lewis



Sharon Lewis is a nationally lauded expert in disability policy spanning home and community-based services (HCBS), education, employment, independent living supports, and person-centered services. At Health Management Associates (HMA), she works with federal partners, states, providers and consumer advocates to advance opportunities for people with disabilities to fully participate in all aspects of community, across the lifespan. Sharon is a collaborator and consensus builder with a natural ability to put policy into practical perspective.

Sharon came to HMA having served in presidentially appointed leadership roles at the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) including Principal Deputy Administrator of the Administration for Community Living, Senior

Disability Policy Advisor to the HHS Secretary, and Commissioner of the Administration on Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities. At HHS, she improved access to quality integrated home and community-based services across multiple programs and funding sources in collaboration with states, stakeholders and other federal agencies. At HHS, Sharon co-founded the Administration for Community Living, established in 2012 to maximize the independence, well-being and health of older adults and people with disabilities, their families and caregivers. As part of the executive leadership team, she helped manage \$1.9 billion in national, state and local programs. Sharon championed investments in preventative home and community-based supports and social services, reducing reliance on unnecessary facility-based care. In collaboration with CMS leadership, Sharon led significant reforms in Medicaid HCBS policy and regulations to ensure community integration and increase person-centered services. She also increased investment in research and development in HCBS quality metrics.

As Senior Disability Policy Advisor to the U.S. House Committee on Education and Labor, and as a Kennedy Public Policy Fellow for the U.S. Senate HELP Subcommittee on Children and Families, she advised members on legislative strategy and disability-related policy issues in education, employment and health care, including passage of amendments to the Americans with Disabilities Act and the Affordable Care Act. At the state level in Oregon, Sharon led public policy, legislative strategy and grassroots organizing for multiple non-profit advocacy organizations (including The Arc) and coalitions for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

Sharon's personal passion is ensuring that the perspectives of people with disabilities, and their families, are central to the development of policies and programs that affect their lives. As a parent to three wonderful daughters, one who experiences intellectual and developmental disabilities, she hopes to help build accepting, diverse and inclusive communities for all.

"When Life Gives You Wheelchair, Make Lemonade"

Zach Anner is an award-winning comedian, show host, and public speaker. In 2011, he won his own travel show on the Oprah Winfrey Network, Rollin' With Zach. He explored world religions in Have A Little Faith, started a conversation on climate change in Earth Your While, and presented good news stories in Top of the Monday, shows produced with Rainn Wilson's media company SoulPancake; he tried his hand at sports and fitness on his YouTube series Workout Wednesdays; and he journeyed across the country



with the help of Reddit in his travel program, Riding Shotgun. His videos have over 100 million views over social media platforms.

Zach has been a guest star, and is now a full-time writer on ABC's hit family sitcom Speechless. He's an Ambassador for the Cerebral Palsy Foundation and has worked with UCPLA Wheels for Humanity, which supplies wheelchairs to people in developing countries.

Zach's memoir, If at Birth You Don't Succeed: My Adventures with Disaster and Destiny, is a hilariously irreverent and heartfelt memoir about finding your passion and your path even when it's paved with epic misadventure. Zach lives in Los Angeles, CA, and spends most of his spare time in his underwear, thinking about how he can change the world.

What We Do:

Systems Change Grants

GCPD strategically funds projects to effect systems change, improve existing policies and practices, and demonstrate new approaches to solving problems.

Improving Public Policy

GCPD ensures that policymakers in Indiana have the information that they need to make informed decisions and that the interests of people with disabilities are considered during policy, legislative, and budget deliberations.

Empowering Advocates

GCPD trains individuals with disabilities and their family members in self advocacy, self-determination, and leadership, along with other areas related to the Council's goals and objectives.

We Change Lives by Changing Systems

The Indiana Governor's Council for People with Disabilities (GCPD) improves the lives of people with developmental and other disabilities in Indiana by strategically funding grants, influencing public policy, and training people with disabilities and their family members to more effectively communicate and advocate for themselves and their communities. GCPD works to ensure that people with disabilities can live independent and productive lives in the community with the supports and services that they need to maximize their potential. The following is a snapshot of just some of the work that GCPD has done in the past five years:

GCPD awarded over \$5 Million dollars grants and contracts and leveraged an additional \$4.25 Million dollars in non-federal funds, including projects that:

- Increase the availability of accessible housing in Indiana
- Increase employment opportunities for people with disabilities
- Improve transportation coordination and access
- Empower people with disabilities to protect themselves from abuse, neglect, and exploitation
- Registered 11,022 individuals with disabilities to vote
- Recruited 28,867 individuals with disabilities to join Indiana's statewide disability advocacy coalition

Over 130 policies and programs were created or improved through Council activities and collaborations, including policies that:

- Provided greater and safer access to the community for people with disabilities through the adoption of municipal ordinances and regulations
- Helped open the doors for individuals with developmental disabilities to attend colleges and universities around the state
- Assisted with the statewide adoption of "Employment First" which makes integrated community employment at competitive wages as the first and preferred outcome for all people with disabilities

Nearly 21,000 individuals were trained to enhance their leadership skills, increase their knowledge, and more effectively communicate with policymakers.

- People with disabilities and families are members of boards and leadership coalitions and remain active in grassroots advocacy since receiving training
- In the words of one recent trainee: "For me, this has been a life changing experience. I now feel that I <u>CAN</u> be the change I want to see in the world."




